THE CHESNUT COLOURED GYPAETE.

THIS gypaete is found, according to Gmelin, in the mountains of Persia: the difference of climate, however, as well as that of the colours of the plumage, may authorize us to consider it as a distinct species from the gypaëte of the Alps, though naturalists have represented it as merely a simple variety.

This bird has the membrane at the base of the beak bluish, the tail cinereous, the under part of the body, as well as the feet, a chesnut colour mixed with white.
