THE PIOUQUEN.

IF we consider, as a characteristical and indispensable mark of the bustard, the having only three toes on the feet, then the bird, which is called in Peru *piouquen*, cannot be considered as one, for it has four large toes, three in front, and the fourth, which is a little more elevated, behind. But, if we examine this bird und e a general point of view, it will be found to possess all the prevailing characters of the bustard, and we shall not be able to refuse it a place among the birds of this species.

Such, at least, is the opinion of Molina, who, in his natural history of Chili, has not hesitated to present the piouquen as a species of bustard, although it has the feet divided into four toes. It is true, indeed, that this author has, more than once, advanced things rather bold, in natural history: but until further observations shall produce further knowledge, the *piouquen* must hold its present station.
