THE LARK OF TARTARY.

THIS species appears to differ from all others in some particular characteristics which are peculiar to it. Its beak is thicker and more convex than that of other larks; the angles of the chaps and its nostrils are covered with feathers, or rather with thick hairs; and its tail, which is of a middling length, is a little forked. Add to these differences a form very considerable, and which is similar to that of the starling.

When the bird is old, the whole body is of a deep black colour; a small whitish stripe, with which the feathers of the head and the under part of the neck are encircled, is scarcely perceptible; this border is somewhat larger on the feathers of the back and under the wing, and hardly apparent on the upper covert feathers; the quill feathers are black; from the tenth quill feather to the nineteenth, they have a whitish edging; all the quill fea-
