which is however distinct from it by the characters of its plumage; it is about five inches in length; its beak, its feet, and the intermediate quill feathers of its tail are black; the top part of the body is of a cinereous red colour, and of a clear red on the under part. There is a white stripe on each side of the head; on the middle of the lateral quill feathers of the tail may be observed a white spot of a square form; the forehead is yellow, approaching to red, and the cheeks are of a cinereous colour.

Before concluding this account of foreign birds, which have a greater or less affinity with the tit-mouse, we will mention two other species, i. e. the tit-mouse of Swby, and that of India and China.

The tit-mouse of Swby is found in a country of Sweden so called. It is entirely a new species, which was discovered by Sparrman. It is almost wholly white, and has some light blue spots upon the tail and covert feathers of the wings; there is also a transversal mark on the nape of the neck; towards the eyes there is a black stripe; five quill feathers of the wings are brown, edged with white; the others are edged with a bluish colour; per-
