THE CROWNED PIGEON OF BANDA.

THIS bird is called by the Dutch, erown vogel, and although it is in size as large as a turkey, there is no doubt of its belonging to the pigeon genus; its beak, head, neck, the whole form of its body, its legs, feet, claws, voice, manners, &c. decide it to be of that family. But, deceived by its size, some naturalists have hesitated to consider it as such, and have called it a *pheasant*. Edwards speaks of it thus: "It is of the family of pigeons, though as large as a middle sized turkey; M. Loten brought from India many of these birds alive.\* It is a native of the island of Banda. M. Loten
