who has spoken of it, and we cannot therefore do better than to repeat his words:

"On the coast of New Holland, in 35° 17', south latitude, and 115° 12', of east longitude, we found a numerous troop of swans, many of which suffered themselves to be taken by the hand; but the others, aware of their danger, soon flew away. This new species is somewhat larger than the wild swan, and of a cinereous grey colour, the hue of which is somewhat clearer under the belly; the beak is blackish, and at its base it is puffed out, and of a sulphureous yellow colour; the feet are slightly tinged with red." ## THE DUCK OF THE NILE.

THERE are various species of wild ducks to be seen swimming on the waters of the Nile both in upper and lower Egypt; they keep on those parts of the river where projecting pieces of the land secure them from the rapidity
