## THE PAPION<sup>\*</sup>, OR THE BABOON, PROPERLY SO CALLED.

IN man the physiognomy may deceive, and the figure of the body does not give an idea of the qualities of the mind; but in the brute, creation we may always judge of their dispositions by their looks, and form a just conjecture of their internal qualities from their external form. For example, if we compare the ape and baboon we shall at once decide, that they greatly differ in their dispositions, and that the latter are infinitely more fierce, savage, and malicious, than the former. The orang-outang, which resembles man. the most of any, approaches also nearest in intelligence, gentleness of manners, and pliancy of disposition. The magot, which is set further from the human figure, and approaches that of the brutes in form of its face
