
of a species of mastodon which, from the structure of the teeth, fills up, as it were, the interval that separates the mastodon from the elephant; it

has been named by Mr. Clift, the Mastodon elephantoides,* (Tab. 26, fig. 2). The teeth, which,
together with the fossil bones and wood before us,
I owe to the liberality of Mr. Craufurd, present
characters very peculiar; for while their structure
is similar to that of the great mastodon, the
ridges in which the crown of the teeth is disposed, resemble those of the elephant; and the
worn surface of the teeth would bear an analogy
with that of the grinders of the African elephant.
These teeth, together with bones and teeth of the
