Between the beaks there is a triangular aperture in the spinous valve, which some naturalists, with much probability, suppose was filled up in a recent state with cartilage, and that the original was a true *Spondylus*. In the present state of fossil conchology, and in an elementary work like the present, it appears to me

desirable to retain the well-known name, originally imposed by the celebrated Lhywd.
