

LIGN. 103. THE ANIMAL OF THE BELEMNO-SEPIA. Oxford Clay. Chippenham; discovered by the Marquess of Northampton, P.R.S.

(From the Hunterian Lectures for 1843, by Professor Owen.)

- a, a. The soft body of the animal; the space between the letters is the receptacle, or horny expansion of the osselet.
 - b. The conical chambered shell, or phragmocone, in the alveolus of the osselet, or guard of the Belemnite.
 - c. The guard, or osselet, which is commonly termed the Belemnite.
 - d. The ink-bag and its ducts, lodged in the cavity of the receptacle, or horny expansion of the osselet.
 - e. The collar of the body.
- f, f. The fins.
- g, g. The eight arms, or tentacula.
 - i. The external opening of the funnel, or siphon, by which the water is ejected in respiration, and for locomotion.
