



LIGN. 103. THE ANIMAL OF THE BELEMNO-SEPIA. *Oxford Clay.*

*Chippenham*; discovered by the Marquess of Northampton, P.R.S.

- a, a.* The soft body of the animal; the space between the letters is the *receptacle*, or horny expansion of the *osselet*.
- b.* The conical chambered shell, or *phragmocone*, in the *alveolus* of the *osselet*, or guard of the Belemnite.
- c.* The guard, or *osselet*, which is commonly termed the *Belemnite*.
- d.* The ink-bag and its ducts, lodged in the cavity of the *receptacle*, or horny expansion of the *osselet*.
- e.* The collar of the body.
- f, f.* The fins.
- g, g.* The eight arms, or tentacula.
- i.* The external opening of the funnel, or siphon, by which the water is ejected in respiration, and for locomotion.
