often strike the backs of their wings together, and thus make a clapping noise.

Pouters stand remarkably upright, and their bodies are thin and elongated. In connexion with this form of body, the ribs are




Fig. 18.—English Pouter.

generally broader and the vertebræ more numerous than in other breeds. From their manner of standing their legs appear longer than they really are, though, in proportion with those of *C. livua*, the legs and feet are actually longer. The wings appear much elongated, but by measurement, in relation to the length of body,
