THE great progress which psychology has made, with the assistance of evolution, in the latter half of the century culminates in the recognition of the psychological unity of the organic world. Comparative psychology, in co-operation with the ontogeny and phylogeny of the psyche, has enforced the conviction that organic life in all its stages, from the simplest unicellular protozoon up to man, springs from the same elementary forces of nature, from the physiological functions of sensation and movement. The future task of scientific psychology, therefore, is not, as it once was, the exclusively subjective and introspective analysis of the highly developed mind of a philosopher, but the objective, comparative study of the long gradation by which man has slowly arisen through a vast series of lower animal conditions.
