These coverings grow at first more than the fetus; but after a certain time it is quite the contrary. Before the end of the third month whe head is bent forward, the chin rests on the breast, the knecs are liffed up, the legs bent bacharats upon the thighs (sometimes the f mocs are so high as almost to touch the jaws), the ams are scmerally fohled across the breast, and one of the havds, and often both toueh the fac. The fotus afterards takes diferent Staations, as it acquires strength. Experencei midinives have pretended to be certain that it changes much oftomer than is eommonly thought, and which they prove by several observations; first, the umbilical cord is oficn found twisted round the body and limbs of the child, in a maner which necessarily supposes, that the foetus has moved in many directions, and taken diferent positions ; secondly, a moiher feels the motions of the fetus sometimes on one side of the womb and sometimes on another; and it ofien strikes against many different places, which must be accasioned by difierent positions, and supposes that it takes diifferent situations; thirdly, as it Roats in a liquid which surrounds it on all sides, it can very easily turn and extead itself by sts own strengih; and it must also take dif-
