my pupils were charged to the full with the striking thoughts and graphic illustrations of the very claborate discourses deemed too high for them, they remembered of the very simple ones, specially lowered to suit narrow capacities, not a single All the attempts at originating a cheap literaword or note. ture that have failed, have been attempts pitched too low: the higher-toned efforts have usually succeeded. If the writer of these chapters has been in any degree successful in addressing himself as a journalist to the Presbyterian people of Scotland, it has always been, not by writing down to them, but by doing his best on all occasions to write up to them. He has ever thought of them as represented by his friend William, his uncles, and his Cousin George,-by shrewd old John Fraser. and his reckless though very intelligent acquaintance Cha; and by addressing to them on every occasion as good sense and as solid information as he could possibly muster, he has at times succeeded in catching their ear, and perhaps, in some degree, in influencing their judgment.
